New Student Checklist

Before Arriving on Campus:

- Download the [Outlook App](#) and sign in to check your Samford email.
- Download the [Navigate 360 app](#) to view your student information and check out a virtual tour of your classroom locations.
- Download the [My Samford app](#).
- Download the iAttended app to be ready to track your convo credits. Follow these [step-by-step instructions](#).
- Add Public Safety's Number, 205-726-2020, to your phone contacts.
- Check out [Bulldog Central](#) to find student organizations.
- Reach out to your roommate to introduce yourself.
- Think through ways to de-stress and relax that work best for you on campus.
- Follow Samford and student organizations on Instagram.
- Download a [Campus Map](#) from Samford's website.
- Talk with your family and support network about how you plan to stay in contact with them during the semester.
- If you plan to use the [Health Center](#) and want them to have access to your medical history, ask your doctor at home to send a copy of your medical records.
- If you have a chronic medical condition or disability, complete the online [accommodation request form](#).

After Move-In and Before Classes Start:

- Check your email daily.
- Check out the [Samford Connections page](#) for a schedule of events.
- Screenshot your class schedule on the Samford portal under "Registration and Schedules" then "Student Profile". **Note:** Locations may change, so be sure to double-check on the first day of classes.
- Locate your classes and follow your route for each day of the week.
- Plan your study/homework times and mealtimes for each day of the week.

- Bookmark the [Caf Menu](#) page to see daily food options and follow them on social media: @samforddining.
- Check your Bulldog Bucks balance [online](#).
- Find two study spaces around campus to try out.
- Download the Samford Rec app to get familiar with the weekly schedule, how to register for fitness classes, how to reserve a massage chair, pickleball, or racquetball court, and find our hours. Download the IMLeagues app to find and register for intramural sports.
- Visit the Library and locate study spots, printers, and Einstein Bro. Bagels.
- Find a [WEPA Print Station](#) on campus and print your class schedule.
- Create a plan with your roommates for sharing dorm spaces (ex: occupying the bathroom, showering schedules, wake-up times, guests, and study hours)
- Find a "Welcome Back Week" event from your email you want to attend.
- Pack your backpack with your laptop, charger, and notetaking supplies.

During the First Week of Classes:

Tips for Building Community...

Through Classes:

- Introduce yourself to a few people in each of your classes. Ask for contact information for at least one person in each class.
- Try to meet people in your major or minor.
- Talk to professors during office hours about interests from class.
- Start or join a study group: Use the “Study Buddy” feature in the Navigate 360 app to find others interested in joining.
- Attend open study halls with the [Academic Success Center](#).

Through Campus Life:

- Sign up for a fitness class, intramural sport, club sport, or try them all with [Campus Recreation!](#)
- Invite a few people to lunch or join someone by themselves at lunch.
- Sign up for a cadre or [Office of Spiritual Life](#) small group.
- Follow @samfordsports on Instagram for the season game schedules.
- Find a few spaces on campus outside of your dorm room to “recharge” when you need time to yourself.
- Reach out to the [Office of Community Enrichment](#) to learn more about events and programming designed to help get students connected at Samford.
- Sign up for volunteer opportunities through Community Cadres, Freshman Serve Day, Community Engagement Week, Spring Break Mission Trip, or Samford Gives Back! Contact the [Office of Community Engagement](#) for details.

Through your Residence Hall:

- Take time to talk/ text with your roommate and suitemates before move-in.

- Create a plan with your roommate and suitemates for what you are bringing to campus (e.g. decorations, appliances, furniture, etc.).
- Set-up roommate agreements for room expectations (e.g. quiet hours, guests, shower schedules, signals for when either of you would prefer time alone/privacy, etc.)
- Try to meet other people on your hall by attending hall meetings and events.
- Ask your RA if they know of anyone else trying to meet new people.

Through Clubs and Organizations:

- Try out different student organizations (even if it is not a current interest of yours!)
- Use [Bulldog Central](#) to explore what events are happening on campus.
- Join a sorority or fraternity within [Greek Life](#).
- Check out the social media pages of organizations on campus.
- Start your own club. (Talk to the [Student Leadership and Involvement Office](#) for details.)
- Set realistic goals for how many events to attend each month.
- Set yourself up for success by choosing events that match your personality or preferences (time of day, noise, energy level, etc.).
- Join the social media page for your class. Example: Samford Class of 2029.
- Ask questions or request accommodations for student events when needed. You can find contact information for student leaders on [Bulldog Central](#).
- Watch your email for campus-wide events.
- Follow @samfordsga and @samfordactivities on Instagram.

Through Leadership Opportunities:

- Volunteer as a tutor with the [Academic Success Center](#).

- Apply for a student leadership position. Examples include Freshman Forum and SGA. (Talk to the [Student Leadership and Involvement Office](#) for details.)
- Apply for an ambassador position. Examples: Wellness, Career Development Center, Study Abroad
- Apply for the EXCEL Leadership certificate program. (Talk to the [Student Leadership and Involvement Office](#) for details.)

Through the Birmingham Area:

- Consider exploring what activities are available in Birmingham that align with your interests. (Check out BHAMnow - <https://bhamnow.com/>)
- Try a few local churches and college student ministries. You can go with a friend or someone from your hall. You can also check out the Church Expo hosted by the [Office of Spiritual Life](#) on campus in late August to learn about some of the local congregations.)
- Volunteer with a local non-profit through Samford's GivePulse page. Contact the [Office of Community Engagement](#) for details.

Through Family and Friends at Home:

- Keep in contact with friends from home. Use their encouragement and support to branch out to new people too.
- Make a plan to keep in contact with your family and home community (i.e. call or text once a week or visit home once a semester).

Through Self-Care and Self-Reflection:

- Be proactive in asking for help and support. Know your limits and personal signs for when you need a little extra support.
- Be mindful of healthy eating and sleep routines.

- Add elements of home to your dorm room for a cozy feel.
- Talk with a professional. [Counseling Services](#) are available on campus and they can help you find local counselors too.
- Know yourself -- Think about what worked well for you socially in high school. How did you make friends? Where did you spend time with friends?
- Find a staff person on campus you trust and reach out when you are having a hard time. The [Samford Care Team](#) can be a great resource during the transition.
- Consider when you usually have the most energy for events and hanging out with friends. Look for opportunities in that time window.

Helpful Reminders:

- Understand the difference between passive and active community building. Creating relationships takes risk and intentional efforts. If you are not putting yourself in situations to meet new people... then you will not meet new people.
- Set reasonable goals within your control.
- Be open to different levels of friendship. Not everyone will be your best friend, but it's nice to have a person to eat a casual lunch with every once in a while too! Or even a friendly person to talk to in class.
- Give it time and be kind to yourself! Many students do not feel fully connected until near the end of their first year. (To be honest, friends and friend groups freshman year are always different by the time you are a junior and senior anyways!)
- Try not to compare. It can feel like everyone else has "found their people" quickly. **Trust us**, there are plenty of students who are still trying to get to know people and are slowly building their community on campus.

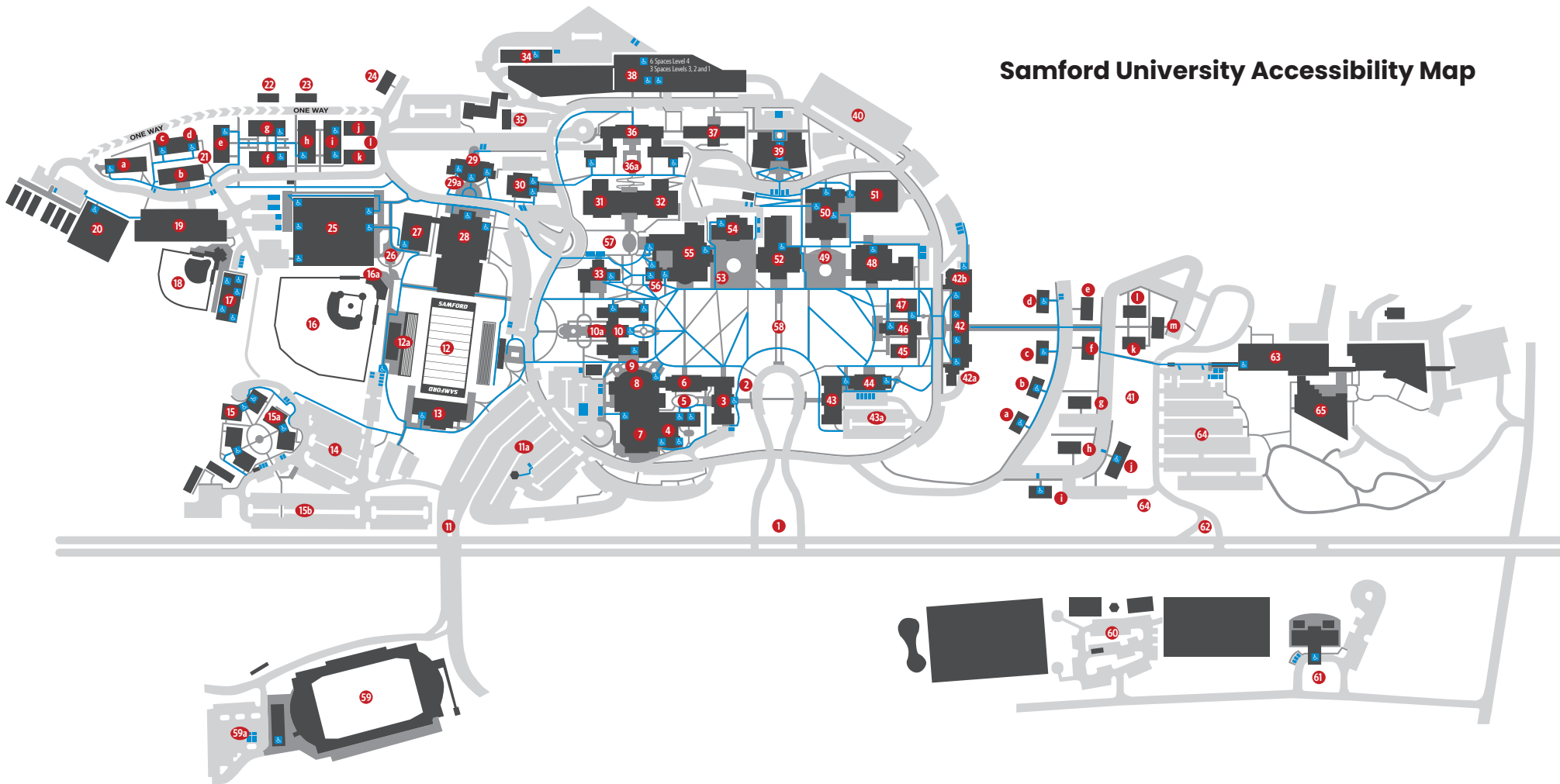
